FIREWORKS DISPLAYS

Are you thinking of holding a fireworks display?

Fireworks displays may be held for events such as:

- Organised Public Displays
 - A community event organised by a community or private organisation e.g. shows, fetes, carnivals and cultural, religious or sporting events. A community event is any event that is open to the public whether or not for a fee.
- Theatrical display
 - Film and television special effects; or
 - Indoor or outdoor theatrical events e.g. concerts and performing arts special effects
- Technical, non-display purposes
 Industrial and agricultural purposes e.g. chimney testing

This Factsheet is intended to assist you with planning for the event in the Yass Valley area.

What is involved if the display is on Council land?

Authority to use Council owned or controlled land for a fireworks display will only be issued for community events.

To use Council owned or controlled land you will need to make a booking to ensure the event does not clash with other users or activities. Fees associated with the use of Council land are included in Council's annual Operational Plan. Bookings can be made through Council's Customer Service Centre.

Prior to the event you will need to obtain Development Consent from Council and the necessary permit from SafeWork NSW.

The event must be conducted in accordance with the requirements of the approvals.

Do I need approval?

With any fireworks event approval is needed from SafeWork NSW. The attached Fireworks Display Checklist assists with the requirements of this process.

Fireworks displays can only be held if a Pyrotechnicians Licence or Fireworks (Single Use) Licence has been issued by SafeWork NSW.

In addition to the SafeWork NSW approval you will also need a land use approval from Council. A Development Application for a temporary land use must be lodged with and approved by Council prior to the event.

Both the SafeWork and Council approvals need to be in place prior to holding the event.

If you are unsure whether you need a Council approval and if you need to make a booking for the site you can contact Council's Customer Service Centre.

What do I need to submit with my Development Application?

Development Applications submitted to Council must include the following minimum standard of information:

- A completed Development Application form
- A written justification for the proposed event
- A completed Fireworks Display Checklist
- A copy of the Applicant's Public Liability Insurance Policy with a minimum \$20,000,000 indemnity with Yass Valley Council nominated as an interested party

What does Council consider when assessing my application?

The issues Council will consider when determining a Development Application for a fireworks display include but are not limited to:

- The appropriateness of the location of the display, e.g. the proximity of the site to residences, hospitals and animal establishments
- The reason for the display, e.g. is the display in the public interest? (Information in relation to the public interest can be found on the NSW Ombudsman's website at www.ombo.nsw.gov.au)
- The types of firework that are proposed to be used, e.g. aerial fireworks as opposed to ground fireworks
- The impact on any affected residents and businesses, e.g. has the approval or support of local residents and businesses been sought and obtained
- The impact on animal welfare
- Public Liability issues
- Noise
- Pollution
- Public Nuisance
- Appropriate notification by the applicant to properties surrounding the display area
- Whether appropriate crowd and traffic management issues have been addressed where the display is likely to draw crowds
- Any local conditions that are considered relevant to the application

What happens if there is a total fire ban in place on the day of the event?

No fireworks display will be permitted to be carried out during a fire ban.

Fireworks display checklist

The checklist is a guidance document only and may be used to identify areas of potential risk for fireworks displays and to assist licence holders when developing a written risk assessment required by WorkCover NSW. Some of the content may not be applicable to fireworks (single use) licence holders, particularly in relation to the use of serial display shalls and serial salutes. Authorities when notified of a fireworks display may also request the completed checklist and/or the separate risk assessment. More information about fireworks display requirements is contained in Australian Standard AS 2187.4 and the Operational Conditions Fireworks.
